Getting Started


- 1. When have you said goodbye to a loved one, waited for a time as they were absent, and then been reunited with that person? How did it feel to see them again?

- 4. Describe your comfort level with the idea of judgment. What does God's all-powerful ruling mean to you? How do you understand His heart in connection to His decision to punish all things evil?
- 5. Pastor Jeremiah asked, "How do we call God good if He allowed evil to forever corrupt the world He created and pronounced to be good?" What did you learn from this week's sermon? If someone were to ask you this question today, what would your response be?
