SMALL GROUP QUESTIONS

Getting Started

 Pastor Jeremiah said, "Wisdom is the skill for navigating life." Describe someone you know who is skilled at doing life well. Pastor Jeremiah went on: "Wisdom is the skill of navigating life. In fact, the Hebrew word for wisdom (hokmah) was used in the Old Testament to refer to skillful sea captains (Ezekiel 27:8). Wisdom is the skill of living successfully according to God's principles."

2. Share *your* story. When have you made a wise decision? What about a time when you made an unwise decision? What was the outcome of each?

Going Deeper

1.Read Ephesians 5:15. How might a person "walk, while looking around"? In what way does "keeping our eyes wide open" help us navigate life well? We also heard that the word *circumspectly* comes from *circum* from which we get *circumference*, so it refers to around. And *spectly* comes from the word from which we get *spectacles*, or something that is *spectacular*. Therefore, *circumspectly* means to *walk while looking around* . . . to walk around with your eyes open.

2. Read Psalm 14:1, Romans 1:21-22, and Titus 3:3-6. If a person is not walking in wisdom, what does this say about their character? Their heart? Their way of doing life? When you become a Christian you move out of foolishness and begin to walk in the wisdom of God, just as you move from lust to love and from darkness to light. It is possible, however, to start off on the path of wisdom as a new believer and find yourself moving off that path and doing foolish things again.

3. Read 1 Timothy 6:9. How might a Christian "self-destruct" even though she/he is a follower of Jesus? Describe an example of this type of personal implosion. We heard, "Any Christian can be tempted; and if he yields to that temptation, he can find himself sidetracked and possibly destroyed. If you walk wisely and keep your focus on godly goals, that won't happen. To do that, you have to walk circumspectly—with your eyes wide open for the traps and snares that are in everyone's path. Living with your head buried in the sand of naivete is a quick way to stumble and fall."

4. Read Ephesians 5:16. In what way might a person obediently live in order to "redeem" the time he/she has been given by God? There are two words in the Greek language that are commonly translated by the word "time." The first word is the word "chronos." This is the word for clock time. We get our word "chronometer" from this Greek word. This is the word for hours, minutes, and seconds. The second word for time is the word "kairos." This is the word that Paul uses here in Ephesians. This refers to a measured, fixed season or period of time. Kairos has to do not with the linear passage of time but with a set period of time. Paul doesn't say, "redeeming time;" he says "redeeming the time"—a specific period of time. The time of which he speaks is the block of time allotted to each of us—our lifetime. He is talking about the time God has given us here on this earth to serve Him. It is a fixed time.

5. Our earthly lives are simultaneously precious and brief. Read the following passages and discuss the need for us to be obediently intentional with the limited time we have been given. God gives us these pictures so we will understand what a privilege we have to be alive since life itself, in the grand scheme of things, is so fleeting. I like what I read once about the gift of time. Paul instructs his readers to "redeem" the time, a word that speaks of quickly snatching up a bargain you come across at the market, a special opportunity that rarely comes. It means to go into the marketplace, search out bargains, and take advantage of them. The bargains would be the wise choices which embody the Christian life.In other words, "Be alert in these evil days to seize the opportunity at making the right choice. When the world is at its worst, Christians should be at their best."

Applying the Message

1. Describe the way in which your life feels complicated, difficult or even overwhelming? When/where did this begin? One way of thinking about this is to remember that *The more complicated life gets through increased opportunities, the more disciplined we have to become about what we choose to do.*

2. Read Galatians 5:16. How might deliberately engaging in a new, obedient way of doing life help you live with less complications? What is the next step of faith that would take you in this direction? Pastor Jeremiah gave us four ways of living more intentionally in obedience to Jesus: 1) Desiring to be filled with the Holy Spirit; 2) Denouncing sin in one's life; 3) Dedicating oneself fully to Jesus; and 4) depending daily on the Holy Spirit.
